With winter behind us, it's time to start thinking green lawns again. I want to remind people about the proper use of fertilizers and pesticides. This is something that not only helps with environmental issues, but could as well save you money.

First and foremost, always read and follow the instructions on the product label. If you need more

information, go to the manufacturer's website and look for the Safety Data Sheet (S.D.S.) for the product you are using. Always be sure you are applying the correct amount, as too much product is not going to work better or faster. Also, be aware of what is around your targeted area and ask yourself the following questions before you begin applying lawn chemicals:

- Will my fertilizer or pesticide reach the storm drain?
- Is the wind blowing too hard and cause my spray to drift off target? This could cause damage to other plants!
- Are they calling for rain? If it rains too soon after applying a product, it could leach into the soil, wash off site, and limit its effectiveness.

Would you like to cut back on using chemicals on your lawn? Research at Virginia Tech shows without a doubt that maintaining a grass height of four inches promotes a healthier root system, keeps the ground around your house cooler, and thickens the sod, which in turn, chokes out weeds.

Dayton Merchants Awarded Façade Enhancement Grant

The Dayton Economic Development Committee is excited to announce that the Town of Dayton Façade Enhancement Grant has been awarded to five different applicants, totaling \$10,000. The Façade Enhancement Grant program is intended to incentivize

property owners within the B-1 zoning district to make improvements to the exterior of their buildings and properties to improve the aesthetic and historic preservation of the community. The grant provides awarded applicants a 1:1 match for specific

improvements. The awarded applicants will be using the money to fund new awnings, front stairs, windows, and exterior paint. This is just another reason to spend time enjoying downtown Dayton this spring!
