Here's the CSP summer event "fine print":

All CSP events will be located at the outdoor pavilion on College Street in Dayton. The events in "()" are not CSP or Dayton events, but we thought you'd still like to mark your calendar. Entrance fee into the live music events is \$5/person for ages 12+ (\$10/person for Bryan Elijah Smith & The Wild Hearts), and the movie nights are free. If you bring a \$5+ receipt from a purchase made at any Dayton merchant from the day of a live music event, your entrance fee is waived. The receipt must have the merchant's name, date and purchase amount. One receipt per person, and one person per receipt. Visit the Dayton website (www.daytonva.us) for information on the Cornhole Tournament and the Dayton Muddler (www.daytonva.us/muddler). Baskets and coolers for food and drinks are permitted at CSP summer events. Coolers with "21-and-over" beverages are allowed at the live music events only and will require an ID check and wristband. Since parking at the pavilion is limited, we encourage residents to walk or pedal to the pavilion for the events if they are able. Parking will also be available in the side lot at Pence Middle School; however, parking is not permitted at the school if you are carrying alcohol to the live music events. While the CSP events are hosted for Dayton residents. friends and family who live outside of Dayton are also welcome. Don't forget to bring your neighbor and lawn chair. We look forward to seeing you on June 14th to kick-off the summer!

Chief's Corner

There is something built into our town police officers' personalities which naturally seeks justice and draws us to engage with those needing help. The interesting thing is that enforcing the law, though inherently risky, is the easy part of what we do. The legislative body of the Commonwealth orders us to enforce a multitude of codes that are designed to provide a safe, peaceful community for all. Once someone has broken the law, it becomes pretty cut and dry as to what must happen. It's the prevention of crime and the rehabilitation of the offender that is difficult.

As a whole, we'd much rather have positive, constructive interactions with all of our citizens than the sort that results in an arrest. No doubt, an arrest can be a positive, life changing event for a person making poor decisions. Lives have been changed for the best by spending time behind bars, but we'd rather intervene beforehand with an offer of help.

Here's the thing. We all know that we can't help folks unless they want to be helped. So I'll ask you as you read this. Do you need help, or does someone you know want help but

doesn't know where to turn? Are you addicted to alcohol or drugs and don't wish to be? We can get you help before the car crash or overdose. Are you in a state of depression or suicidal and want to feel a smile again? We can find the right help for you. Are you in an abusive relationship? We can get the many forms of help you require. Are you the abuser? We can find anger management help for you prior to the handcuffs. In short, if you have a problem that police officers typically get called to in order to clean up the aftermath, we'd rather you reach out to us beforehand so that we can assist you.

Communication with us is the first step. I recognize that approaching a policeman that you've never met can be intimidating. I recognize that you may have had only negative interactions with law enforcement. We want to change that. The Dayton Police Department hires problem solvers, and we are unique. The small town atmosphere and a council that supports our initiatives provide this opportunity to you. We would much, much rather listen to your troubles, and help you help yourself work through them. Wait-

ing until your troubles grow to the point where our interaction concludes with an arrest isn't the best way to get help, but we will help afterwards also, so long as you want it.

You may stop by to see us, make an appointment to meet with us, or reach a Dayton Police Officer by calling 540-434-4436, day or night. If it is an emergency, please call 911. You may also e-mail me with your questions at dhanlon@daytonva.us. I've taken the liberty of providing below a very few of the many resources available that you may wish to explore in the event you'd rather take matters completely into your own hands. There are *many* other options available.

HELP KEEP OUR PARKS CLEAN

At last, the warm summer days are upon us! After such a harsh winter, we can put away our sweaters, coats and boots, and bring out the shorts, sandals and swimsuits. We can finally enjoy being outdoors working in the flowerbeds and gardens, having cookouts, spending time at the parks, and indulging in lots of other summer activities.

With the frequent use of our Town parks during these warm

weather months, there will be lots of picnics, reunions, public events, and children playing and frolicking in the grass at our parks.

As a friendly reminder to our residents owning dogs, we ask to please help keep our parks free of dog waste. This has been a growing concern. The Town provides dog waste stations in each of the parks that include bags and disposal containers. Please be mindful of other residents while walking your dog around the neighborhood as well by carrying a bag to pick up your dog's feces and disposing of it in the trash. Using two plastic shopping bags (one inside the other) works great. Also, dog urine can be harmful to

shrubs and other plants, so please do not allow your dog to urinate or defecate on the property of others.

Dog feces left laying around is a public health and safety concern—it is unsightly, a breeding medium for germs and disease, and a huge hassle on the sole of a shoe. Removing dog feces and disposing of it properly is a responsibility that every dog owner should proudly participate.

The Town provides three parks for public use: Sunset Park, Cooks Creek Park, and the new College Street Pavilion. For information on shelter reservations and fees, call the Dayton Town Office at 879-2241.
