

I often find myself stifled when considering what to write for each edition of the Dayton Discovery. I want it to be meaningful, but wonder what is interesting enough to at least be glanced at, and how I might temper the conversation so that at worst, it's only mildly offensive. With a grin on my face, I tell you straight—it's a struggle.

Have you ever been curious to know what a law enforcement officer's (and veteran's) perspective is on living in a free country? Take a moment and think of the many circumstances that you personally may wish for greater governance and enforcement, or where you'd like less. Perhaps you feel strongly one way or the other about noise issues, cluttered properties, taxes, recycling. trash removal rates, aroma de la farmland, immigration, broken windows, inoperable cars, the height of grass, or horse drawn means of conveyance. Whatever your opinion, I promise that

there are persons within our community who have opposing views.

What does living in a free country have to do with this? P.S. One of my favorite Thanksgiving dessert recipes:

Pumpkin Gooey Butter Cakes Ingredients

Cake:

1 (18 ½-ounce) package yellow cake mix

8 tablespoons butter, melted

- 1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 1 (15-ounce) can pumpkin
- 3 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 8 tablespoon butter, melted
- 1 (16-ounce) box powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

Combine the cake mix, egg, and butter and mix well with an electric mixer. Pat the mixture into the bottom of a lightly greased 13 by 9-inch baking pan.

To make the filling: In a large bowl, beat the cream cheese and pumpkin until smooth. Add the eggs, vanilla, and butter, and beat together. Next, add the powdered sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg, and mix well. Spread pumpkin mixture over cake batter and bake for 40 to 50 minutes. Make sure not to over bake as the center should be a little gooev.

Snow Removal From



The winter season is quickly approaching and we want to extend a friendly reminder regarding snow removal from public sidewalks for the safety of our pedestrians.

Dayton Town Code §2-64, states that all persons occupying, owning or having charge of any property within the town shall be required to remove the snow from the entire sidewalk in front of such property within six daylight hours after the snow has ceased to fall, or the Town may have the snow cleaned off at the expense of the owner or tenant. We appreciate your support in complying with this code.
